PARENTAL CONSENT

I hereby give my consent for my child to participate in the School Health Services Program. - I am responsible for obeying all laws, including copyright. This also means I may not use the District logo or other Districtowned content on my personal posts.
- I do not have the right of privacy when accessing the Internet or network while at school.
- · Communicating electronically includes using my camera and cell phone to communicate visually.
- When communicating electronically, I should ask myself: Is it safe? Is it kind? Is it respectful? Is it appropriate?
- I do not have an **absolute right** to take, publish/post photographs or videos of others at school, as it may impact their individual rights of privacy.
- Bullying or harassing someone either in person or electronically is wrong, violates the Code of Student Conduct, and is against the law.
- Information I find on the Internet is not necessarily true or accurate.
- There are filters to prevent access to inappropriate information, but no filter is perfect. Every user must take responsibility for his or her use of the network and Internet and avoid objectionable sites, content and communication.
- The District reserves the right to monitor, inspect, copy, review and store, without prior notice, information about the content and usage of
 internet, school networks, district issued electronic accounts, email and electronic devices. Students should have no expectation of
 privacy over matters sent or received through such electronic resources.

Students may be moved to advanced level classes due to proficiency on their FSA or previous coursework. A Parent/ Teacher Conference is required to move up or down a level once classes begin.

Information regarding Advancement in Math and Sciences for students:

High achieving students interested in taking accelerated courses with the opportunity to complete high school level math and science courses *while in middle school* may elect to participate in courses offered at CLMS. Both 6th and 7th grade math and science options cover more than one year of standards in order prepare students to take 9th grade course work in 8th grade. Grades students earn in high school level courses will affect the student's GPA for future scholarship and class rank purposes. Students may participate in one of the following accelerated options: Accelerated Advanced Options - Students have the potential to earn a minimum of 2 high school credits by the completion of 8th grade.

Spanish 2 (1.0 credit World Language, Spanish 1 is a Pre-Requisite, affects high school GPA), Computer Science Discoveries (1.0 credit Elective & Math, Affects high school GPA)

6th Grade Semester- Long (Half Year) Elective Courses:

Health Grade 6 (Required)

The purpose of this course is to provide students with the opportunity to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to become health literate and practice responsible behaviors to promote healthy lifestyle and healthy living. This course focuses on the comprehensive health issues core to the optimal development of adolescents.

Fitness Grade 6

The purpose of this course is to provide a foundation of knowledge, skills, and values necessary for the development of a physically active lifestyle. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to student success in this course and in the development of a healthy and physically active lifestyle.

Exploring Music

Students explore the essential elements of 20th- and 21st-century music in America (e.g., jazz, rock, soul, blues) and global cultures (e.g., Latin, Bollywood, European, Asian, world drumming). Students reflect on the significance of social influences and historical events on the development of music. Participants focus on the creation, use, and performance of music; and the modes of listening, distributing, and gaining access to music.

2-D Studio Art 1

Students explore media and techniques used to create a variety of 2-D artworks through developing skills in drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage. Students practice, sketch, and manipulate the structural elements of art. Investigation of artworks from Western and non-Western cultures provide a means for students to expand their understanding and appreciation of the role of art in global culture. Student artists use an art criticism process to evaluate, explain, and measure artistic growth in personal or group works. This course incorporates hands-on activities and consumption of art materials.

Art in World Cultures

Students explore art from around the world through project-based activities. Based on directed investigation, students reinterpret selected forms to promote understanding of themes, purposes, symbolism, and traditional formal characteristics. Students compare various cultural responses in art to universal themes, gaining respect for diverse perspectives and the rich heritage shared by cultures from around the world. Supporting geographic, cultural, and societal studies, and historical context help students refine their understandings of time and place in global cultures. Students consider the value of preserving these works in today's museums and other public buildings, private collections, and in digital format for sharing and study via the Internet.

6th Grade Full Year-Long Elective Courses:

Band 1

Students develop foundational instrumental technique, foundational music literacy, and aesthetic musical awareness through rehearsal, performance, and study of high-quality band literature. Instrumentalists work on the fundamentals of music notation, sound production, instrument care and maintenance, and personal and group rehearsal strategies. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Chorus 1

Students develop beginning vocal technique and skills, critical and creative thinking skills, and an appreciation of music from around the world and through time. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom.

7th Grade Semester-Long (Half Year) Elective Courses:

Coding Fundamentals 1 & 2

The purposed of this course is to learn the basic principles of various operating systems, programming design and programming language. Students will learn problem-solving skills to work in various computer platforms.

Introduction to Technology

The purpose of this course is to give students an introduction to the areas of technology and to introduce students to the design and problem-solving processes using manipulative skills while working cooperatively with others in team activities.

Exploring Technology

The purpose of this course is to give students an opportunity to explore the areas of technology and associated careers available in technical fields. Students will be given the opportunity to solve technological problems while gaining an understanding of the effects of technology on our everyday lives.

2-D Studio Art 1

Students explore media and techniques used to create a variety of 2-D artworks through developing skills in drawing, painting, printmaking, and collage. Students practice, sketch, and manipulate the structural elements of art. Investigation of artworks from Western and non-Western cultures provide a means for students to expand their understanding and appreciation of the role of art in global culture. Student artists use an art criticism process to evaluate, explain, and measure artistic growth in personal or group works. This course incorporates hands-on activities and consumption of art materials.

Team Sports 7

The purpose of this course is to develop the physical skills necessary to be competent in many forms of movement, knowledge of team sports concepts such as offensive and defensive strategies and tactics, and appropriate social

behaviors within a team or group setting. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to the success of this course.

Comprehensive PE 6/7

The purpose of this course is to build on previously acquired knowledge, skills, and values necessary for the implementation and maintenance of a physically active lifestyle. The course content provides exposure to a variety of movement opportunities and experiences which includes but is not limited to: Outdoor Pursuits/Aquatics, Individual/Dual Sports and Alternative/Extreme Sports. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to student success in this course and in the development of a healthy and physically active lifestyle.

7th Grade Full Year-Long Electives:

Band 2

Students develop foundational instrumental technique, foundational music literacy, and aesthetic musical awareness through rehearsal, performance, and study of high-quality band literature. The course content provides exposure to a variety of movement opportunities and experiences which include but is not limited to: Outdoor Pursuits/Aquatics, Individual/Dual Sports and Alternative/Extreme Sports. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to student success in this course and in the development of a healthy and physically active lifestyle.

Exploring Aerospace Technology

The purpose of this course is to give students an opportunity to explore the area of aerospace technology and its

associated careers. Students will be given the opportunity to solve technological problems using a variety of tools, materials, processes, and systems while gaining an understanding of the effects of aerospace technology on our everyday lives.

Fundamentals of Culinary Careers

The purpose of this course is to assist students in making informed decisions regarding their future academic and occupational goals and to provide information regarding careers in the Hospitality & Tourism career cluster.

Individual/Dual Sports 8

The purpose of this course is to develop the physical skills necessary to be competent in many forms of movement, knowledge of individual and dual sports concepts and behaviors. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to the success of this course.

Comprehensive PE 7/8

This course builds on previously acquired knowledge, skills, and values necessary for the implementation and maintenance of a physically active lifestyle. Course content provides exposure to a variety of movement opportunities and experiences which include but is not limited to: Outdoor Pursuits/Aquatics, Individual/Dual Sports and Alternative/Extreme Sports. The integration of fitness concepts throughout the content is critical to student success in this course and in the development of a healthy and physically active lifestyle.

8th Grade Full Year-Long Electives:

Band 3

Students with previous band experience build on instrumental technique, music literacy, and aesthetic response through rehearsal, performance, and study of a variety of high-quality band literature. Instrumentalists expand their knowledge of music notation, music theory, sound production, and personal and group rehearsal strategies. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Chorus 3

Students build on previous choral experience to expand vocal, technical, musical, and ensemble skills through rehearsal, performance, and study of high-quality choral literature. Singers focus on increasing knowledge of music theory, music literacy, and aesthetic response. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom.

3D Studio Art 1

Students begin an exploration of the structural elements of art used when creating 3-D forms. Processes are used to manipulate and construct sculptural or ceramic forms in media that may include, but are not limited to clay, wood, plaster, found objects, and paper mâché. Student artists examine the effects of attention to detail, size, position, overlapping, visual pattern, and texture, and these considerations will be reflected in the surface and structural qualities of completed art forms. Student artists use an art criticism process to evaluate, explain, and measure artistic growth in personal or group works. This course incorporates hands-on activities and consumption of art materials.

Computer Science Discoveries (HS Math 1.0 credit)

Computing is so fundamental to understanding and participating in society that it is valuable for every student to learn as part of a modern education. Computer science can be viewed as a liberal art, a subject that provides students with a critical lens for interpreting the world around them. Computer science prepares all students to be active and informed contributors to our increasingly technological society whether they pursue careers in technology or not. By Completing and passing this course students will receive 1 credit of high school math towards high school graduation requirements.

Spanish 1 (HS World Language Elective 1.0 credit)

Spanish 1 introduces students to the target language and its culture. The student will develop communicative skills in all 3 modes of communication and cross-cultural understanding. Emphasis is placed on proficient communication in the language. An introduction to reading and writing is also included as well as culture, connections, comparisons, and communities. By completing and passing this course the student will receive 1 credit of high school world language elective credit that can be used towards meeting graduations requirements.

Spanish 2 (HS World Language Elective 1.0 credit)

Spanish 2 reinforces the fundamental skills acquired by the students in Spanish 1. The course develops increased listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills as well as cultural awareness. Specific content to be covered is a continuation of listening and oral skills acquired in Spanish 1. Reading and writing receive more emphasis, while oral communication remains the primary objective. The cultural survey of the target language-speaking people is continued. By completing and passing this course the student will receive 1 credit of high school world language elective credit that can be used towards meeting graduations requirements.

Intensive Literacy (Required Course for students with FSA scores of levels 1 or 2)

The purpose of this course is to provide instruction that enables students to accelerate the development of reading and writing skills and to strengthen those skills, so they can successfully read and write grade level text independently. Instruction emphasizes reading comprehension, writing fluency, and vocabulary study using a variety of literary and informational texts encompassing a broad range of text structures, genres, and levels of complexity. Texts used for instruction focus on a wide range of topics, including content-area information, to support students in meeting the knowledge demands of increasingly complex text. Students enrolled in the course will engage in interactive text-based discussion, question generation, and research opportunities. They will write in response to reading and cite evidence when answering text dependent questions orally and in writing. The course provides extensive opportunities for students to collaborate with their peers. Scaffolding is provided as necessary as students engage in reading and writing increasingly complex text and is removed as the reading and writing abilities of students improve over time.

Middle School Course Recovery & Graduation Enhancement Program

Middle School Course Recovery - Students who have failed any core academic course (language arts, math, science, and social studies) will be placed in the MS Course Recovery Program. Being scheduled into course recovery requires the student to be withdrawn from 1 or both elective choices depending on the amount of course recovery needed. This enables the student to recover the course(s) failed and work toward meeting their middle school promotion requirements.

Student Support and Assistance Program - Believing that all children can learn and that environments conducive to learning can stimulate student success, this program focuses on academic, social, emotional, and physical needs of each individual "at-risk" student. For whatever reason, students may become Off Track and At Risk during their school careers. It is the job of the Graduation Enhancement/SSAP teacher to serve as a case manager who develops an Action Plan for each student and monitor the student's attendance and academic progress until promotion to 9th grade. The SSAP teacher will provide academic advisory services, special pull-out programs and communication between home and school.
